- Use the following for place names and travel vocabulary: flashcards and crossword puzzles. (A)
- Complete textbook written and listening exercises and activities on vocabulary and grammar. (A, M)
- Complete workbook written and listening exercises and activities on vocabulary and grammar. (A, M)
- Complete teacher made worksheets on travel vocabulary and grammar (the accusative and genitive cases). (A)
- Repeat directions after the teacher and after native speakers on CDs. (A)
- Memorize the conjugations of the "going" verbs in the past, present, and future tenses. (A)
- Practice the use of spacial expressions to express where places are in relation to other places. (A, M)
- Identify and discuss different kinds of transportation systems. (A, M)
- Translate vocabulary terms from Russian to English and from English to Russian. (A)
- Play a class game in which students must ask and tell directions. (A, M)
- Practice asking for directions on the phone using the accusative and genitive cases. (A, M)
- Use motion verbs to indicate destination in past, present, and future tenses. (A, M)
- Complete cultural readings and related activities in the textbook and workbook. (M)
- View appropriate DVDs, (in Russian and English), YouTube videos (in Russian) and complete related activities. (A, M)
- Explore appropriate Russian websites on travel. (M)
- Listen to native speaker conversations and determine what directions are given. (M)
- Use websites such as www.quizlet.com or www.masterrussian.com to reinforce vocabulary, pronunciation, grammar, and conversational skills. (M)
- Complete American Council of Teachers of Russian, "Olympiada of Spoken Russian" practice materials. (A, M, T)
- Telephone a classmate to determine when s/he is free, determine where to meet, and discuss how each will get there. (T)
- Listen to a native speaker give directions and summarize in Russian what is said, orally or in writing. (T)
- Speak on the telephone in Russian accepting a friend's invitation to visit and asking for travel directions and information on types of transport. (T)
- Read an authentic Russian city map and create a mini-dialogue discussing which places to visit that day and how to get to them. (T)
- Telephone a friend or relative and, in Russian, indicate a plan to visit Russia. Discuss which cities to visit and how to get to the cities. (T)
- Telephone a classmate and, in Russian, invite him/her to get together, then suggest places to go around town and how to get to them. (T)
